

Jamshedpur Coin Museum is a home to numerous Indian coins and foreign currencies. It is a great place for peeking into the past of the region as well. The museum houses some of the most prized possessions of the country and the world. Historic coins of ancient India and ancient world are displayed in this museum. The museum is not only a place for amusement but is also a source of knowledge, education and information. Each of these displayed coins in the showcases has respective descriptions mentioned about the displayed coin. Excluding the national holidays, the birth anniversary of Jamsetji Nusserwanji Tata, and certain festivals, every season is suitable for visiting Jamshedpur Coin Museum. A mint mark is a letter, symbol or an inscription on a coin indicating the mint where the coin was produced. There were also a range of coins with the mint marks clearly denoted. It was a very unique piece of information. Overall, it was a very informative exposure for the students.
