

PPT Presentation on Literary Criticism

In a class activity the students of Sem V Batch 2017 presented well through power point presentations on the various theories of literary criticism. The ppt activity was coordinated and conducted by Dr. Manoj Kumar Pathak, Assistant Professor, Department of English, AJU to examine some of the great literary critics of the 20th century, writers whose ability to produce focused, inspired, and influential readings of major works of literature has been widely recognized. The focus was on studying, and learning from, exemplary readings of major literary works. In other words, this was not a course in literary theory. Readings of landmark critical texts was combined with selections of canonical texts of English and continental European literature. The presentation was almost certainly attended to the following critics/literary works: William Empson and Stanley Fish on Milton's Paradise Lost; Erich Auerbach, T.S. Eliot, and Charles Singleton on Dante's Divine Comedy; Christopher Ricks, John Bayley, and Cleanth Brooks on Keats; Frank Kermode and Rene Girard on secrecy and desire in the nineteenthcentury novel; Geoffrey Hartman and Alan Liu on Wordsworth; Jean Starobinski and Paul de Man on Rousseau, and Walter Benjamin on Goethe's *Elective* Affinities.

In the introductory note, Dr. Manoj Kumnar Pathak said that a very basic way of thinking about literary theory is that these ideas act as different lenses critics use to view and talk about art, literature, and even culture. These different lenses allow critics to consider works of art based on certain assumptions within that school of theory. The different lenses also allow critics to focus on particular aspects of a work they consider important.
